


Sand Hollow Hurricane, UT


We saw his great 1951 Willy's Overland truck and 1947 Jeepster, too. It was an amazing time and we really enjoyed getting to talk with and learn from David.




YouTube + OnX = Awesome Overland Trip Eastern Utah


While waiting for our Colorado trails to open up I was watching one of my favorite YouTube Overlanders. I noticed a cool trail section where the vehicles were going through a deep canyon with bridges overhead. Of course, they didn't say what trail they were on, but

they did mention that they were in the San Rafael Swell. So, the search for this trail began.

I opened my OnX app and started searching. From the size of the two bridges I figured they had to be under Interstate 70. Switching to OnX's 3D Hybrid view, I quickly found the canyon I was looking for. It was Eagle Canyon which is part of the Swasey Cabin Trail system. Next, I used OnX's Route Builder tool to build a roughly 90-mile overland route from Justensen Flat OHV Staging Area down to Hanksville, UT. Three days later we were on our way with a quick overnight camp in Moab.




I was worried about the I-70 underpass at the staging area. Other reports estimated the max height to be 7'2". My Gladiator which has a 3.5" lift, 37" tires, and a SuperPacific X1 camper with traction boards on the cross bars measures 7'8". I was aired down to around 20 psi and was able to make it through without scraping the top or the sides . Full-size trucks, even stock, probably would not fit due to axle width.





Just a few miles from the staging area the view I was looking for, Eagle Canyon, opened up before my eyes. Navigating Eagle Canyon to Swasey Cabin you will also pass Eagle Canyon Arch.

We continued on to Temple Mountain Road (well-manicured gravel road) where I was able to mark numerous campsites for future use before finally settling on our favorite with an epic view of Temple Mountain.



From there I followed my OnX route to Goblin Valley State Park. While the park does have a \$20 entrance fee, it was well worth the short detour.


The hoodoos, aptly called Goblins, give the park its name. You could spend a day here on its own, but a cold front was chasing us so we pressed on to our next section, Wild Horse Road, a scenic trail through a sand wash and an easy water crossing of Muddy Creek.





We completed our overland trip by taking Coal Mine Road to Factory Butte. While we started getting glimpses of Factory Butte earlier in the day, it was truly magnificent up close and personal.

We wrapped up our journey in Hanksville, UT with a burger, fries, and shake at Stan's (which I highly recommend).

Seep Springs Canon City, CO

A day-trip to the Seep Springs/Red Rock Canyon area of Canon City is a favorite early spring destination for clubs in southern Colorado.

Generally, this area misses the heavier snows that fall some 30 miles north at higher elevations like Victor/Cripple Creek.

Colorado Land Cruisers spent a sunny Saturday in the area on trails off County Road 69 and BLM Road 5830.





While this was a day-trip, the area has plentiful dispersed camping (and designated site camping within Red Rock Park), so it could easily be stretched to an overnight or even multi-night trip.

For an extended outing, other routes to include might be Shelf Road (BLM Road 88) and Phantom Canyon (BLM Road 86, County Road 67), as well as a visit to Cripple Creek and Victor.
